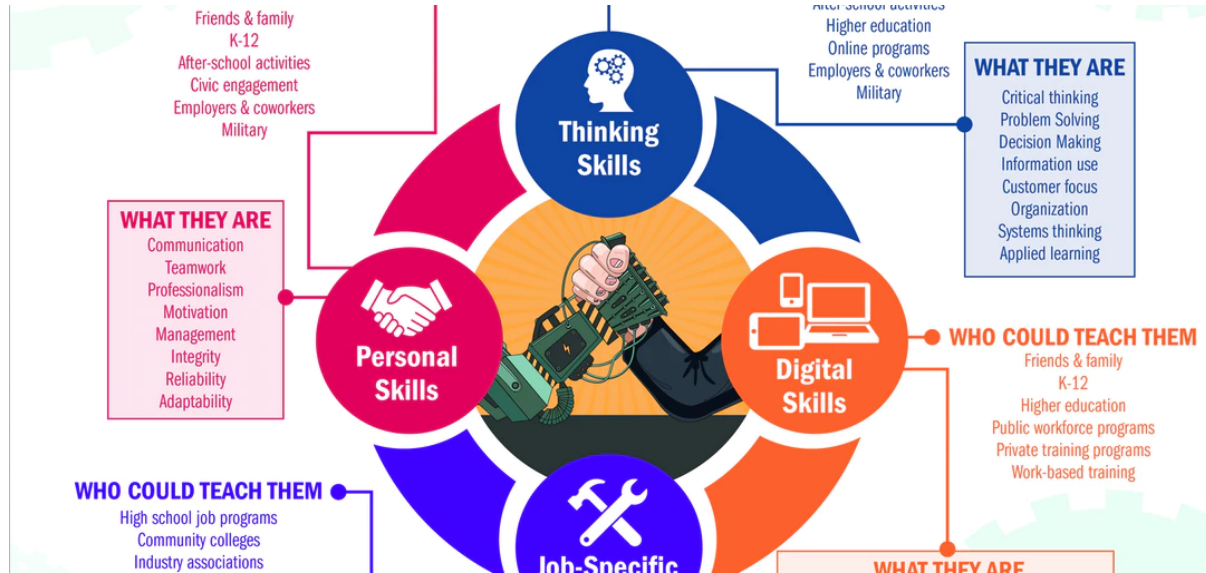


# Automate This: Skills People Need to Compete in the Digital Economy, and Who Could Teach Them



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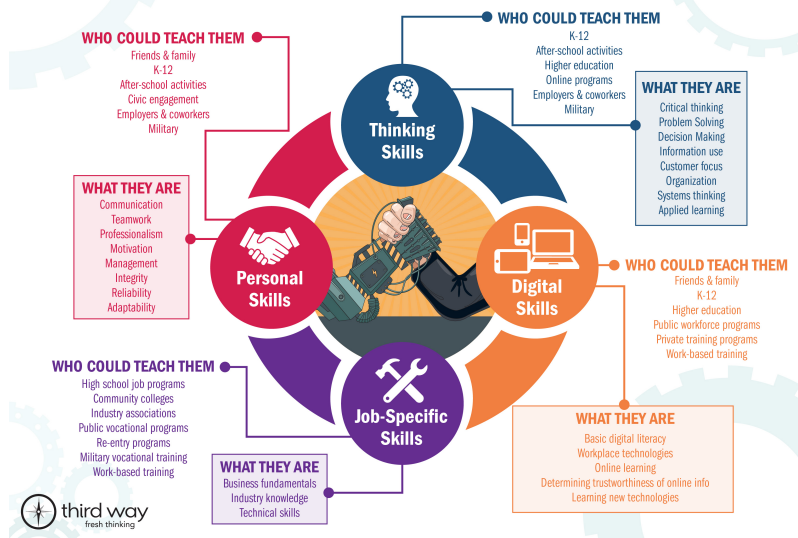
